The above photo displays the Smith's wrap-around front porch and butterfly garden at their home in Rio Vista Terrace. These plants are maintained with irrigated water collected by the Smith family using barrels. The photo below shows the Smith's elevated barrels beside the house that collect rainwater from the roof at the Smith home. The irrigated rainwater quenches the garden, which consist of a specificallychosen variety of plants that attract helpful pollinators, such as butterflies, bumblebees and hummingbirds. This type of water-collecting system preserves water that would have been otherwise wasted. Using barrels for water collection is both environmentally conscious and fiscally responsible. A house with a wrap-around front porch on a corner lot offers an unusual landscaping opportunity, which Casey and Christina Smith have used to showcase native and naturalized Texas plants and to attract pollinators such as butterflies and hummingbirds. The Smith home at 1061 Sycamore Street, in the Rio Vista Terrace neighborhood, is Spring Lake Garden Club's choice as Yard of the Month for Öctober.

The Smiths moved into their home late in 2008, but lived overseas for three years while Casey taught at an international university campus in Saudi Arabia. Christina recalls that she felt at home seeing a yellow flowering shrub there which was a twin to the Esperanza which graces so many local gardens here in San Marcos. She also loved the Date Palms in Saudi, but unfortunately neighborhood squirrels spoiled the trees she tried to grow here. Casey and Christina chose other trees for their property, joining several large Texas Pecans at the back and neighbors' side of the house, along with an old Tallow tree shading the front steps, and a few volunteer Mountain Laurels.

Christina explains that except for new trees, everything in the yard originated as seeds or cuttings. One of the four Smith children succeeded in growing a seed from a Texas orange, and the outcome now graces the side street yard, near a peach tree, caged to deter deer. A Mexican Plum fills out this orchard trio, and a tall Esperanza provides a splash of yellow among its green-leaved neighbors. Trees planted facing Sycamore Street appropriately include two Sycamores (a gift from Christina's mother) and a Buckeye, acquired from a plant sale at San Marcos Nature Center years ago. The centerpiece of the Smith's front yard is a butterfly

garden, ringed with limestone rocks from a family property in Kerrville. A Texas Bird of Paradise (Caesalpinia gilliesii) reminds Christina of El Paso where she grew up. This colorful bloomer, also called Desert Bird of Paradise, is similar to the popular Pride of Barbados (Caesalpinia pulcherrima) but distinct from it and from the Mexican Bird of Paradise with more rounded leaves. Other plants attracting pollinators in the garden are Blue Mistflower (an Aster), Red Salvia, Rosemary, Lantana, Butterfly Bush (Buddleia), and gray Cenizo. Christina suspects that aphids attacked the Milkweed plants now bearing leaves only at the end of their stems, but the plants still stand tall in the garden to attract migrating Monarch butterflies.

Another mid-lawn planting bed near the corner protects a maturing volunteer Mountain Laurel, surrounded by Salvias, Lantana, and other drought-resistant natives. Garden beds near the front of the house include plants that "came with the property" - deep purple Wandering Jew (Tradescantia) and Daylillies. Near the porch steps, a concrete bird bath is surrounded by Four-o'Clocks grown from seeds from Casey's grandmother's garden. Beds on the side of the house feature ornamentals: Irises, Roses, and Moonflowers. All beds are thickly mulched with material available every second Saturday from the City of San Marcos.

All garden areas, including vegetable beds in the backyard, rely on rainwater for irrigation. The Smiths have a total of eight rain barrels for landscaping and occasional car washing. A mixture of Horseherb and Bermuda Grass makes a sustainable lawn which requires little mowing. Perhaps the best advantage of this corner landscape is that the whole front yard- butterfly garden, new trees, pass-along plantscan be viewed from a seat on the front porch, where the gardeners may enjoy the visual fruits of their labors.
